- •• "Ditch the perfect symmetry look and add interest by placing exclusive and stylish furniture pieces in curves and organic shapes. Bold and statement pieces of furniture, classic arches, parametric patterns, and shapes that flow organically in any interiors can be used to make the interiors lively and luxurious," adds Ruchi.
- •• Today, upholstered pieces like sofas, chaises, and benches are being designed by using undulation and asymmetry as guidelines. They make an excellent attraction in large interiors.
- •• Take note of patterns: This season, bring in instant sophistication to your interior spaces by mixing bold patterns and edgy prints.
